“COME ON OVER PASTOR”

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There is something very powerful about a personal visit. When I was a parish pastor, I talked with this one woman every Sunday at church. We talked about the weather, about local politics, about the Packers - but it was not until I was invited into her home did I learn about her life and had a view into her soul. Over a cup of coffee, one evening, this working mom shared her sorrows and her joys. We talked about her spiritual journey, her mountain top experiences and her walks into the valley. It was a wonderful hour for me. Based on that experience, I came to know her and to become her pastor!

There is something very powerful about personal visits when pastors sit down with parishioners in their homes, or in some other informal setting, and share life. When I visit with congregation councils and clergy call committees, I hear over and over again that “we want a pastor who will learn to know us and care for us”. In the comfort of the home, we learn about each other and learn to trust deeper in God’s Word and each other.

If I was starting a new call as a parish pastor, I would intentionally offer to visit every member of the congregation



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council, the teachers in the Sunday School and the families of all of my confirmation students. That would be a start. Perhaps some people will not want to be visited in their homes. That's fine. At least I would offer a visit to all. Wherever we visit we would talk about the congregation, about spiritual life, about God's love and we would pray. We probably would also talk about the weather and the Green Bay Packers and drink a little coffee, too.

Invite your pastor over to your home or out for lunch. Tell her or him about your life. Invite the pastor to share what is happening in his or her soul. Good things will happen. There is nothing like faith filled conversation.

ELCA SOCIAL STATEMENT ON SEXUALITY

Draft to be Released March 13, 2008

The whole Church is in the process of developing a social statement on human sexuality. The draft document will be released on March 13, 2008, and will be available on the ELCA website. Copies will also be mailed to all of our congregations. As you may know, **Pastor Corrine Johnson (Concordia, Palmer and Our Saviour's, Suomi)** from our Synod serves on this churchwide task force entrusted to write a document that expresses the Church's witness on the issues surrounding sexuality.

This continues to be a work in progress! Broad involvement in the process is vital. Our “feedback” is needed as we read and re-

flect on the proposed draft statement. To that end, there will be at least one hearing sponsored by the Northern Great Lakes Synod to reflect on this matter, and to hear the Synod's members express their opinions. Comments from these hearings, which are being held in every Synod, will be used to finalize a Proposed Statement on Human Sexuality. That proposed statement will be the document that the ELCA Church Council, including **Pastor David Jensen (Ascension, Minocqua)**, will review and recommend to the 2009 Churchwide Assembly. More information on our Synod's hearing, probably scheduled for late June, will follow from our office.

Your 2% Worth

If 75% of our ELCA Board of Pension Health Care insured members take the confidential Mayo Clinic Health Risk Assessment, good things will happen all around the Synod! Our congregations will save money (about 2% of the annual premium - hundreds of dollars in most cases) and each member will get up to \$300 into a 2008 personal wellness account!

Our Northern Great Lakes Synod has 112 persons (including spouses) who are enrolled in the ELCA Medical Benefits Plan. Our magic number is "84". If 84 members in our Synod participate in the health survey, all members will benefit with reduced premiums for 2008. As of February 1, only 36 have taken the Mayo Clinic Health Risk Assessment. We have a ways to go!

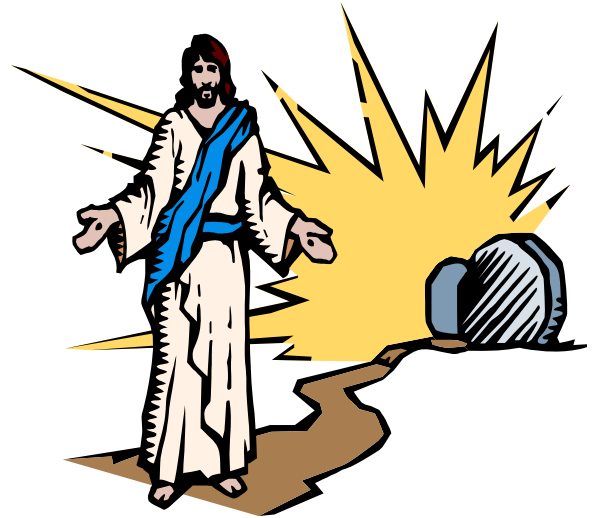

It was a Thursday evening that we met with the oncologist – Mom, Dad, my three brothers, me and our spouses. Sad, reflective and quiet, we listened and learned as our worst fears were confirmed – fears that Mom had advanced stage pancreatic cancer. Treatment options were not being recommended. Any surgery was ruled out. She would have some good weeks and months ahead of her. Comfort care and hospice were encouraged.

Apparently visibly shocked and overwhelmed, we were told we could stay and use the room we were meeting in for as long as we wanted. Never mind that we all secretly wanted to make a mad dash for the door and get the heck out of there - which pretty much ended up being what we did, but sort of in Lutheran slow motion. We headed to our cars and then to Mom and Dad's where turkey soup, fresh bread and coffee were waiting for us. Once we were sipping our soup, Mom called us to attention, "Well, I want to know what you think." We began to talk.

That was Thursday night.

Our next family gathering took place in the back three pews, pulpit side, of First Lutheran Church in Amery, Wisconsin. Mom was literally surrounded by family – her biological family and her congregational family. Among her congregational family, and seated just behind Mom and Dad, was her primary doctor and his spouse – the very same doctor who had ordered the CT scans, the MRI, the biopsy, the cancer marker blood test, and all the rest. This was the doctor who had spoken with us about his suspicions, prescribed the first pain medications, and listened to our concerns when one of us cornered him in the hallway or the cafeteria. This was the doctor who was now singing the same hymns, chanting the kyrie, praying the same prayers, and worshipping the same triune God, the Redeemer, Savior, Healer and Friend. It would not be the last Sunday that Dr. Craig Johnson sat in the pew close to our family.

What a witness and what a comfort to gather around Word and Sacrament – to hear proclaimed in the liturgy, in the reading of scripture, in the hymns, in the sermon, prayers, and in the meal, in the symbols of the faith that surround us in the sacred space of the sanctuary, the same sanctuary where we will someday soon bring Mom as part of her final journey home, and be reminded of God's promises of a new and eternal life in heaven, forever in the presence of God and those who have gone before us.

It's sort of a Lenten journey making our way to the celebration of Christ's resurrection and the promise of ours.
